This new 20-inch racer comes from the CW factory in Orange, California, and is designed for the larger racer. CW has, in a few short years, developed one of the most complete lines of frames, forks and handlebars for BMXers. Woody Itson reports on this new CW, the CW ZXL Pro.



"The design stops here." According to CW (Custom Works) factory owner, Roger Worsham, "I feel that we have come up with the perfect frame and fork combination for the five to six foot tall rider. The ZXL Pro frame and fork have been two years in the making, and with test riders like Mike Miranda, Clarence Perry and Tracer Finn; you know it has to be a hot one in order to pass these guys' standards.

To give you a little background, CW used to be Coast Wheels and Coast Wheels was sold in 1981. From Coast Wheels, Custom Works evolved; an all BMX frame and fork manufacturer owned by Roger Worsham in Orange, California. Since then, CW has taken up making handlebars and seatposts.






The forks are made by CW; ZXL Pro's. The rims are Araya 7X's and the tires are Comp III's.


According to Woody the ZXL Pro is one of the best jumping bikes he has ever ridden.

The ZXL came with a 178mm Ashtabula single-piece chromemoly crank, a Pete's Precision Products 44 tooth front chainwheel, a Sugino spider and KKT Lightening pedals.

velopment that went into the design of the ZXL Pro frame and fork.

There is also a smaller version of the ZXL Pro frame available, called to ZS, for the smaller rider, CW also makes a mini frame (XM), a 24-inch mini-cruiser (TFM) and a 24-inch full size cruiser (TFL). Besides frames and forks, CW makes a chromemoly seatpost and five different handlebars. A mini bar made from aluminum and four other chromemoly bars, a mini cruiser, a cruiser, a standard and a pro bar. The pro bar lately has become one of the hottest pro sized handlebars nowadays.

Roger also released some top secret information about the development of a new extra long 20-inch frame. It will be two inches longer overall than the ZXL pro frame; an inch in the front and an inch in the back. There will only be a limited supply of these extra-extra long frames available. This will probably be one of the longest 20-inch frames on the market, if not the longest. The reason for the limited supply is because Roger doesn't want somebody too small to try and race it. The frame will be for the truly six-foottall and over rider. It will be tested

ZXL PRO

The CW ZXL Pro is a very light frame at 3 lbs. 14 oz., giving this month's test bike an extremely light feeling. The ZXL Pro is one of the best jumping bicycles I have ever ridden. The ZXL Pro's lightweight characteristics made it easy for me to maneuver the bike anyway I wanted it to, in the air or on the ground.

The positive traction you get on the CW ZXL is one of its best qualities. It sticks to the ground in almost any kind of turn. Speed jumping was very easy due to the light front end. But the thing I liked best was the fact that I had plenty of room to pedal. I never once bumped my knees on the handlebars.

With the lightweight front end the bike might tend to loop on you at first, but once you get the feeling of the ZXL Pro, you can totally cut loose in the air and still have total control the whole time. I might also mention that all CW frames and forks are made from 4130 chromemoly tubing and are heli-arc welded.

Custom Works is an appropriate name. The quality and handling put into all CW products is unsurpassed. Roger Worsham has done an excellent job of building CW into what it is today.
