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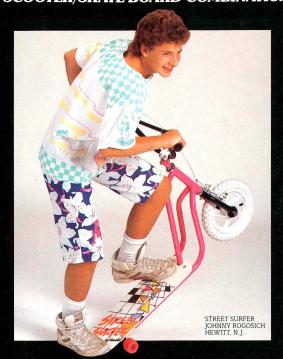

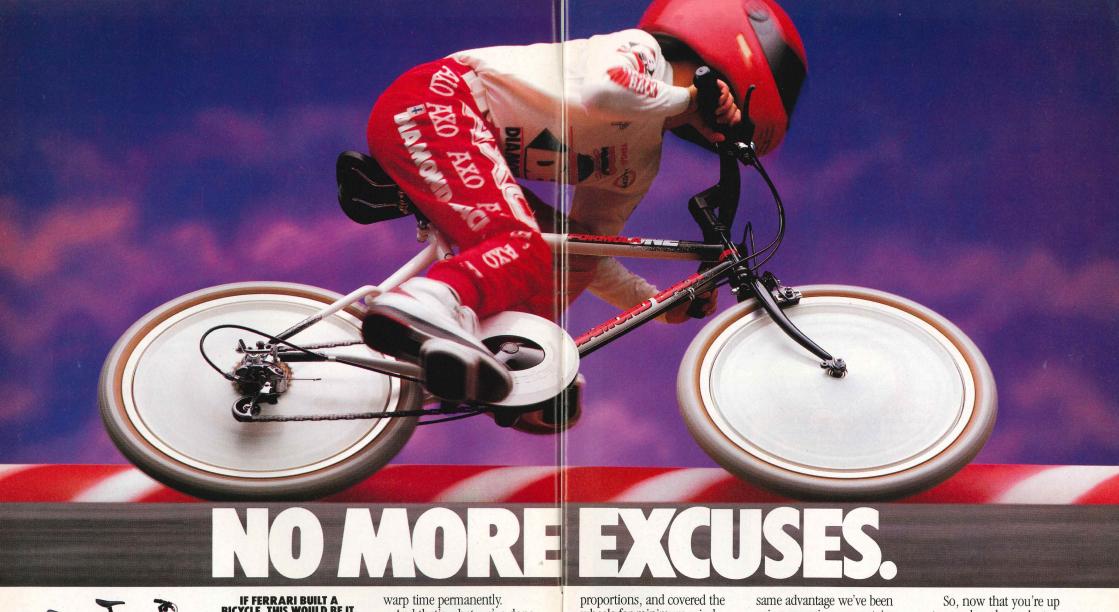

PRO SERIES RACES:

The ABA has fewer nationals than last year [13, plus the Grands) and has made ALL of 'em a pro series. Which essentially means everyone will be at all of them-except for maybe the three which are scheduled the same day

The NBL has 18 nationals plus the Grands. But only seven of those are Pro Series races, which the pro AND team wins will count towards NBL No. 1 titles. The NBL says if pros and teams are chasin' titles, they'll need to hit at least 5 of those Pro Series plus go to the Grands . . . compared to the ABA, where you need to get in 10.

SUMMER TOURS:

The ABA is planning another summer of magazine-tours. Nothing has been confirmed yet. And of course, the NBL has their summer tour dialed in between South Park and Indiana.

So . . . as that great philosopher Charlie Gnarly once said, "Hath bike, will race. Hath a tour, will chase. Hath an endo-mumph, will land on face." (Charlie never was much good in ryhmes.)

Steve Blackey, known by most downhillers as the "Landshark," is starting up a mail-order GPV shop which'll specialize in gravity powered complete bikes, parts, or conversions. He's probably gonna call it "Landshark GPV's."

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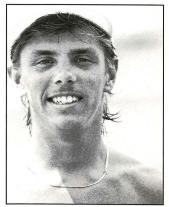
"IT WAS A TRIP, MAN." -Travis Chipres

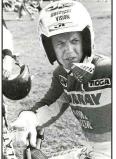

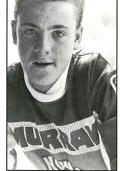
MURRAY DROPS TEAM!

The Reno road trip had been planned two months in advance. But you know how plans are—they never go as planned.

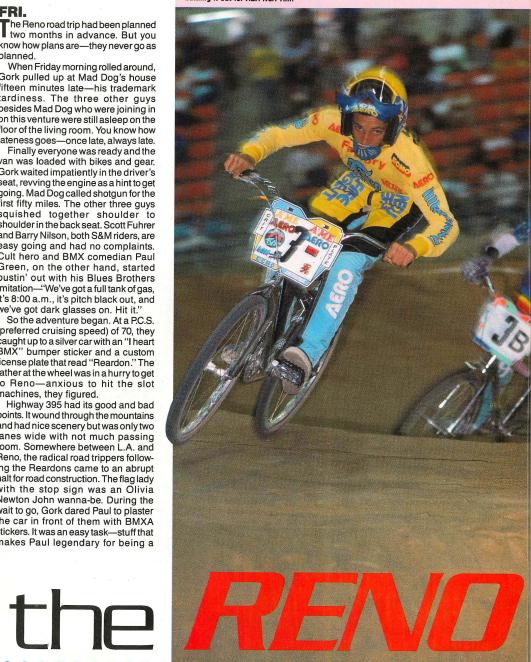

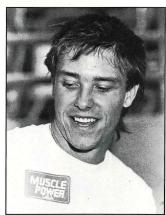

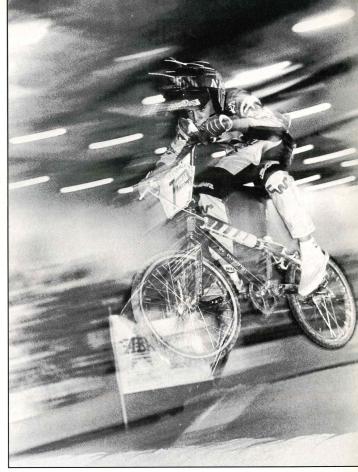

Five passengers that sailed that day for a three day tour.

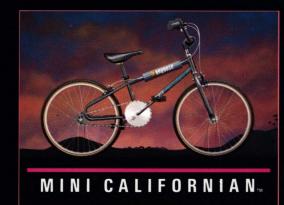

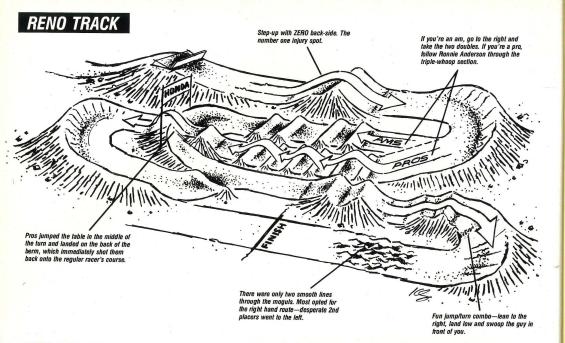

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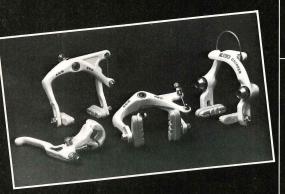


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So they hired Joe H. Ashbury.

HINTS AND HOW-TOS.

"I seriously think the funnest part of GPV racing is rigging up a bike. At least, for me it is."

> -Gork November 10, 1987

DEFINITION: A GPV (Gravity Powered Vehicle) is a new form of race bike. It's used for going fast down paved roads, preferably with lots of turns. Good handling and killer brakes are mandatory. Weight distribution is vital. Special modifications are left up to the imagination.



EXAMPLE BIKE NO. 147: Almost a year ago at the first GPV Grands on G.M.R., Rich Sigur wanted more weight than the 10 pounds in his bottom bracket, so with a little bit of clear shipping tape and a boulder . . .

By handlebar and clamp the stem to the flipping it upside down, the fork rake cross-bar is also slower and more stable at high

FARINGS: Wind resistance is essential on downhill courses with long straightaways. On roads with a lot of turns, good handling is more important. Depending on how much you want to spend, types of farings can range from number plates to sheets of plastic to motorcycle pieces. Once again, let your brain go crazy and see how wild you can get with the materials you can get your hands on.

WEIGHT: According to the brand new official GPVA rule book, bike and rider can not exceed 250 pounds. And the bike alone can't weigh over 50 lbs. How they're going to enforce it is still unknown, but . . . decide for yourself whether weights work or not. Ask your pyshics teacher if you have to. On frames being used regularly, you can attach dumbells through the bottom bracket.

SPECIAL MODS: Steering dampeners are not necessary but can come in handy. What they do is hold the forks straight ahead to eliminate immediate wash-out over bumps. Getting a dampener can range from buying one from a motorcycle shop for \$30 to \$50

to stealing one off your parents screen door. The latter is used most often.

Bicycle horns, police sirens. speedometers, and sticker panels on the side can all be added for looks. sounds, and smell.

SUMMARY: That about covers building up a GPV. Now all you need is a hill. We've heard of some guys in Florida putting bikes together just for the fun of it. And then there's a large guy in New York who uses his to ride down parking garages.

Wherever you decide to go down. make sure you abide by the law. Try using roads that have no cars on 'em. Don't downhill during rush hour. Use blocked roads when possible. Ride safely-not insanely. And don't be afraid to use your brakes!

EXPLANATION: Since BMXA first premiered downhill racing to the public in the July '86 issue, the unknown masses have sent in letters asking how they can set up their own GPV. So, in preparation for the 1988 GPVA race season, we're pleased to give you a few hints and examples of how the experts made theirs.

INSTRUCTIONS: Start with a regular 20-inch bike-it's the norm. Some people run 24-inchers, but most sav that the twentys are ideal since they keep you lower to the ground.

HUBS: Smoothness and rolling resistance is a must when it comes to your wheels. Everybody should know that Campy hubs are the VERY best. Others swear by sealed bearing hubs-GT's work great.

WHEELS: Twenty inch wheels, front

and back, are ideal. The 16 inch front/20 inch rear combo DOES NOT work. Downhill expert, "Landshark," is experimenting with a 1 3/8 rim in the back, which goes to prove how far the imagination can go. Sixteen inch wheels are practically banned and are slower, anyways.

TIRES: When thinking of tires, you need to consider two things—traction and rolling resistance. At high speeds in a straight line you'd like to have a center bead. You WON'T want to use knobby tires, like Comp-IIIs. Knobular tires are lame for downhilling because they'll wash out in every turn and cause bodily raspberries. The favorite tire in GPVing right now has got to be Tioga's

Comp Pool-the baldy. FRAME AND FORK: You get two choices here-have the frame in it's
